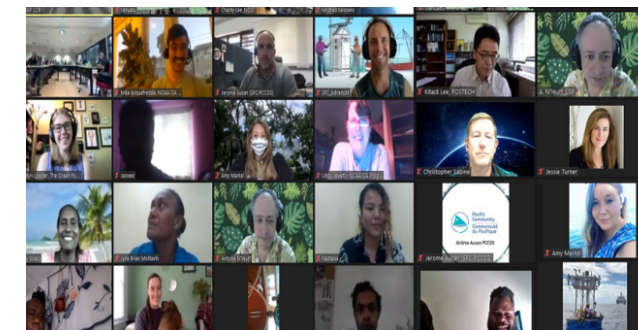


We are part of the solution.
