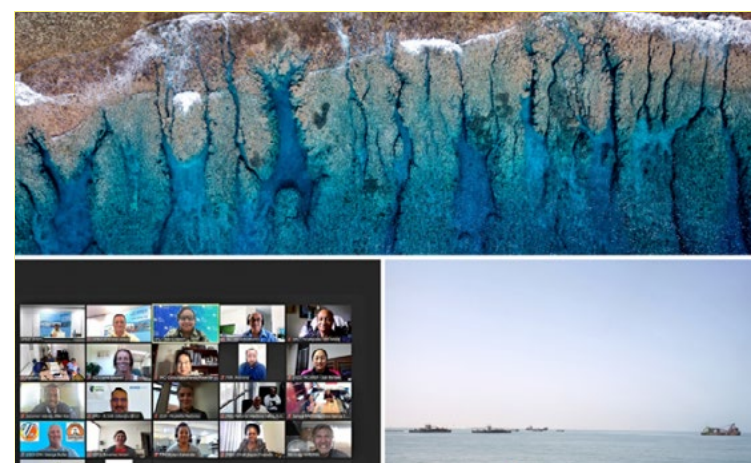


Our People, our Pacific Environment: Q and A with Maraia Slade-Pogi

Samoa's Minister of Natural Resources and Environment, Hon. Toeolesulusulu Cedric Schuster, offered the reflection when he addressed a webinar to discuss the main findings of the report, reiterating the call on the developed world for urgent climate actions.

The webinar was hosted virtually by the Pacific Climate Change Centre in partnership with the Institute for Climate, Energy and Disaster Solutions at the Australian National University.
